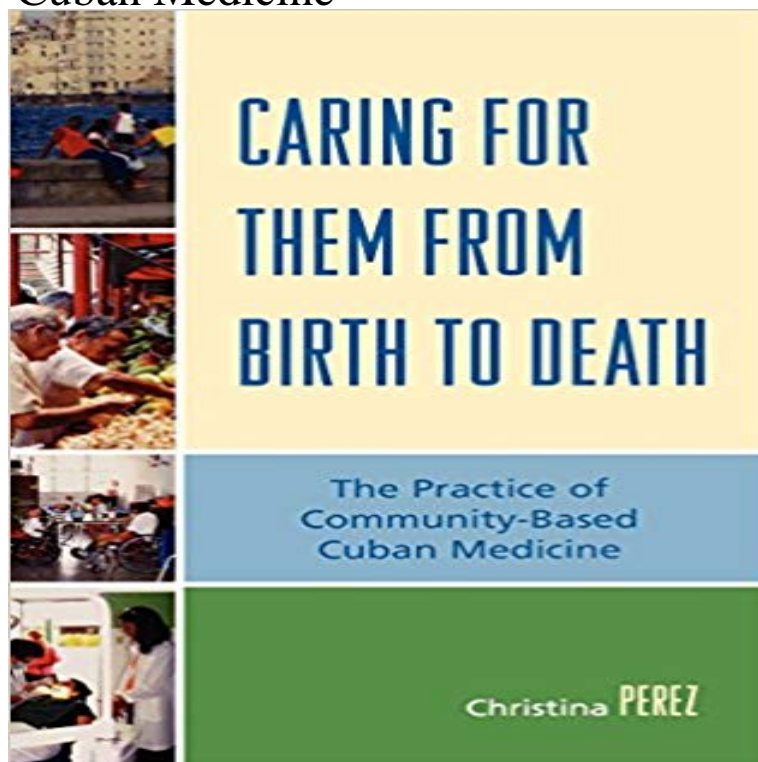


Caring for Them from Birth to Death: The Practice of Community-Based Cuban Medicine
